

I LIVED IN PORTUGAL DURING A FASCIST REGIME. THERE WAS DEFINITELY A HEAVY WEIGHT ON ALL OUR LIVES. THE FIRST MANIFESTATION OF THE REGIME WAS POLITICAL AND MANY OF THE PEOPLE WHO WANTED TO INITIATE CHANGE INTO A FAIRER AND MORE HUMANE SYSTEM, GOT SECRETLY WATCHED AND ENDED UP IN A POLITICAL PRISON AND POLITICAL PRISONERS WERE OFTEN TORTURED.

THE 25<sup>TH</sup> OF APRIL 1974 REVOLUTION WAS THE MOST EXHILARATING EXPERIENCE THAT A COUNTRY COULD GO THROUGH COLLECTIVELY. EVERYONE RAN OUTSIDE, SMILED, BELIEVED AND ENJOYED THAT FREEDOM. SUDDENLY IT SEEMED THAT CENSORSHIP HAD DISAPPEARED AND EVERYTHING COULD BE DISCUSSED OPENLY. THERE WAS SO MUCH HOPE!

IN DECEMBER 1974 I MOVED TO LONDON, WHICH GAVE ME THE COURAGE TO STUDY ART AND TO FORM THE BAND. A BAND IS A GROUP OF PEOPLE, AND IT SEEMS TO ME THAT THE BEST RESULTS COME MOSTLY FROM EACH PERSON BEING ABLE TO EXPRESS THEIR OWN THOUGHTS, IDEAS, DESIRES AND DREAMS MUSICALLY WITHIN THAT GROUP.

ROUGH TRADE HAS PLAYED AN ENORMOUS PART IN MY LIFE. IN 1977 I FELT HONOURED WHEN GEOFF TRAVIS ASKED ME TO WORK AT THE SHOP AS HE FELT IT WAS IMPORTANT TO HAVE A WOMAN THERE. BANDS WERE FORMING, PHONE NUMBERS EXCHANGED, FRIENDSHIPS MADE, MUSIC, FANZINES, BADGES WERE BOUGHT.

WE STARTED THE RAINCOATS FATE THAT SUMMER, AND, IN 1979, GEOFF OFFERED TO PUT OUT OUR LP. WE WENT ON TOUR IN MAY AND I STOPPED WORKING AT THE SHOP. THE RAINCOATS BEGAN A PARTNERSHIP WITH ROUGH TRADE, WHICH ALLOWED US THE SPACE TO FLY OUR WAY AND WE RELEASED FOUR ALBUMS TOGETHER.
